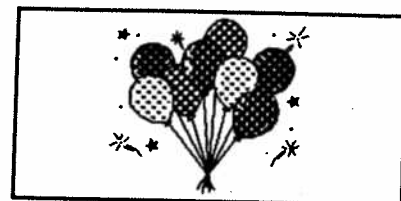

#### ★CM MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The MLA CM Management Committee is charged with the day to day operation of the electronic journal. The Committee, consisting of MLA's Past-President John Tooth, who acts as chair; Director Tracey Keryluk; Treasurer Cynthia Holt; MLA member Lorrie Andersen; and CM staff Duncan Thornton, Editor, and Peter Tittenberger, Executive Assistant, have been meeting every two weeks since the inception of the journal.

#### Inaugural Issue

With five working days, CM staff were able to develop and upload the first issue of CM which was demonstrated at the CLA Conference in Calgary on Friday, June 16. With introductions from Pat Cavill, President, CLA, I talked briefly about CM and, using the Internet lab, I demonstrated the journal which was available thereon as a menu item on Conference Home Page. Reaction was highly positive and complimentary. By accident, I encountered Charles McClure, who presented at MLA several years ago, and he invited me to talk later that morning at his session on the evaluation of electronic resources. It was quite exciting; McClure talked theoretically about the new electronic paradigm; I talked practically about CM on each issue he raised. ### ★PEARCE PENNY WINS AWARD

Former CLA President, **Pearce Penny** was one of the first five Canadians to win a Canadian Citizenship Recognition Award in July in Ottawa. He was nominated by CLA.

The Awards have been established with the support of Corel Corporation and the major corporate sponsorship of Bell Canada to recognize Canadian citizens who have made outstanding contributions to Canadian society in professions/categories which are chosen by the Canadian Citizenship Federation and which are not normally recognized at a national level.

Pearce's citation indicated that he has made a real *difference to libraries at the community, provincial, national and international levels*. In addition to his CLA activities, he has served as President of APLA and represented Canada at the Commonwealth Library Association (COMLA). He just completed a distinguished career as Provincial Librarian of Newfoundland.

"Sustaining the Vision" was the theme of the 24th Annual Conference of the International Association of School Librarianship held July 17-21 1995 in England. There were over 150 delegates from 21 countries

### ★UMANITOBA HAS NEW LIBRARY SYSTEM

A new Library system has been acquired to replace the PALS Library System (Bridge). The new system is the Data Research Associates (DRA) system and will be called Bison. It runs on a Digital Alphaserver 2100 which has a clock speed of 190 mhz, 513 Mbytes of memory, and 12 Gbytes of disk storage. The operating system is Open VMS.

Bison provides the same basic functionality as the PALS system plus many new features. One new feature is the capability to Telnet to other DRA library sites and, in some cases, non-DRA systems to access their research and bibliographic databases. The actual look and feel of the system is quite different but the on-line Help facility makes the transition easier.

Initially, system interaction will be via a menu called Information Gateway. Sometime in the near future a Windows-based client called DRAFIND will be available. A MAC version is also expected.

The basic system is available now with the enhanced features becoming available sometime this fall. Other library functions will be converted over the remainder of the fiscal year.

All system access will be via telnet. The UMOPAC address now access Bison. The public userid will also be Bison. Dial-in access will also be via Telnet from the UMnet prompt, followed by selecting Bison. Bridge will be kept around for a given period but databases will not be updated.

### ★SCI-FI DONATION TO WPL

A donation to Winnipeg Public Library from some avid science fiction buffs will provide readers with new opportunities to explore science fiction and fantasy books.

The ConAdian World Science Fiction Convention board of directors and the convention chairman have presented WPL with a donation of \$1000 for the purchase of new science fiction titles. John Mansfield, Convention Chairman, said the group chose to donate to the public library as a literacy initiative - to share their love of science fiction literature with other readers.

Presentation of the cheque was made at a reading by Charles grant, author of a paperback series based on the X-Files television show.

### ★COPPUL EXPANDS EAST

The Council of Prairie and Pacific Libraries (COPPUL) announced the extension of its distribution of electronic data from the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR) to include two Atlantic Provinces' universities - Dalhousie University (Halifax) and the University of New Brunswick (Fredericton).

"Cooperation between academic institutions is not only desirable, but increasingly is being shown to be fiscally beneficial," said Bill Maes, Chair of COPPUL and Director of Library and information Services, University of Regina.

Coordinated by the libraries in each university, the federated membership, called ACCOLEDS (A COPPUL Consortium of Library Electronic Data Services), provides access to ICPSR data resources. These resources currently consist of over 30,000 machine-readable files, covering all areas of the social sciences, as well as studies in some areas of the life sciences such as health care and aging. In addition, training opportunities in social science research methodology, statistical techniques, and data library management are available.

## ★MEDIA AWARENESS NETWORK

The National Film Board is creating a Media Awareness Network, a new information service on the Internet for those who are concerned about the influences of media on the attitudes and expectations of children. The new network hopes to raise public awareness on media issues, support media education in the schools and promote good quality children's entertainment in Canada. It will offer Canadian educators and organizations access to on-line database and interactive conferences or newsgroups. The database will contain information on teaching resources, conferences, speakers, workshop facilitators, government, industry organizations and non-governmental organizations and groups dedicated to parent awareness and student education. The on-line service will be available on internet and through the federal Access to Justice Network (ACJNet).

Education, parent, community, industry and government organizations and departments are invited to participate in the development of the Media Awareness Network, which will be formally announced when long-term funding has been secured. ## ★WILSON EXPANDS ABSTRACTING

H. W. WILSON to expand abstracting unit, expand Dublin Operations, gather All Abstracting Units in a Single Location

## ★NATIONAL DIGITAL LIBRARY

In May, leaders of 15 of the largest US research libraries and archives and the Commission on Preservation and Access signed an agreement that pledges collaboration toward the establishment of a National Digital Library Federation. At the signing held at Harvard university, the founding members of the Federation agreed to cooperate on defining what must be done to bring together, from across the US and beyond, digitized materials that will be made accessible to students, scholars, and citizens everywhere, and that document the building and dynamics of US heritage and cultures.

A primary goal of the Federation is the implementation of a distributed, open digital library accessible across the global internet. The library will consist of collections to be created from the conversion to digital form of documents contained in founding member institutions and other libraries and archives, and from the incorporation of holdings already in electronic form. In support of this goal, the Federation will establish a collaborative management structure, develop a coordinated funding strategy, and formulate selection guidelines to ensure conformance to the general theme of US heritage and culture. The Federation also will adopt common standards and best practices to ensure full informational capture and guarantee universal accessibility.

## ★SLA GRANT STUDIES ELECTRONIC PUBLISHING

SLA has selected Carol Tenopir, Professor, School of Information Sciences, University of Tennessee, as the recipient of its 1995 Steven I. Goldspiel Research Grant to study the impact of electronic publishing on special libraries.

Among the questions to be answered are:

- \* how are current & potential electronic journals being published & distributed?
- \* what is the size and nature of the journal system?
- \* what are the specific journal system functions? To what extent is each function currently being done through electronic means?
- \* what are the journal system costs for the functions performed using traditional & electronic processes?
- \* how is traditional information search & retrieval likely to be affected by electronic publishing?
- \* how will electronic publishing affect copyright issues?

The results will be presented at the 1996 SLA Annual Conference in Boston and published in the fall of 1996.

## ★ISM APPROVED FOR INFO

ISM Library Information Services, the Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Recreation, Metropolitan Toronto Reference Library, Ontario Library Service-North, and Southern Ontario Library Service are pleased to announce the successful completion of a comprehensive testing program to confirm that ISM's AVISO and Postmaster software meets specifications and performance requirements for the Information Network for Ontario (INFO).

Seventeen Undyed public libraries, of all sizes, with different hardware configurations and varying levels of ILL activity, participated in the extensive testing program carried out over the past 4 months. Now, with formal acceptance, the software will be released to over 350 public libraries throughout Ontario.

With AVISO ILL and messaging software, library staff are able to prepare requests and manages the ILL process in a fully automated fashion. Requests are then sent in batch to the Postmaster (a standard internet mail server and statistics gathering tool) in one of the 3 agencies and are automatically forwarded to the appropriate library.

## ★CISTI ON CATSS

ISM Library Information Services and CISTI are pleased to announce that the complete file of CISTI's serials holdings is now available in ISM's Cataloguing Support System (CATSS) database. By mid-summer, CISTI's monograph holdings will also be available on CATSS.

ISM customers now have access to CISTI's bibliographic records and holdings for cataloguing and document delivery. The CATSS reference and ILL module, REFCATSS, allows for the capture and verification of CISTI data which can be downloaded to AVISO, ISM's ILL management system. ### ★CAN/OLE TERMINATED

The National research Council has undertaken a review of its activities to see where NRC can have the greatest impact in the Canadian economy within limited resources. All areas of NRC have been affected, including CISTI.

As part of this strategic planning, CISTI did an assessment of the CAN/OLE service in light of the changing marketplace, new technologies, needs of their clients and the increasing availability of electronic information from other sources. They found that CAN/OLE is no longer viable in the 1990s environment. In addition, the current CAN/OLE system reached the end of its lifecycle. It does not meet the increasingly sophisticated needs of their clients. Given the financial constraints recently imposed on NRC, and the large number of alternative information services now available in Canada, it is not practical for CISTI to invest in upgrading the CAN/OLE system.

Therefore, CISTI has decided to terminate the CAN/OLE service as of December 31, 1995. Until then, the CAN/OLE service will be fully operational with ongoing updating of databases.

### ★ACCOUNTING FUNDAMENTALS

Ideally, libraries and information centers exist to provide information of the highest quality, instantly and in unlimited quantities. In actuality, cost is a major factor, according to Madeline J. Daubert, author of *Money Talk: Accounting Fundamentals for Special Librarians*.

In this self-paced study guide published by SLA, Daubert asserts that in order to make decisions based on economic factors, librarians must fully understand the financial affairs of the areas for which they are responsible. To this end, the workbook is designed to introduce concepts needed to manage the financial affairs of a library or information center.

Daubert is a certified public accountant and library financial consultant. In addition to working as a library director, she has taught financial management at the graduate schools of the university of North Carolina, Texas Woman's University and the university of South Florida.

### ★EBSCO'S PRICE STUDY

The total cost of a one-year subscription to all the titles listed in *Index Medicus* has climbed 51.4% over the last 5 years. According to the fifth edition of the *Index Medicus Price Study* just released by EBSCO Subscription Services, the 2,547 pre-priced *Index Medicus* titles cost a total of \$919,242.39 in 1995, compared with just over \$600,000 for 2,386 titles in 1991.

## ★PUBLIC LIBRARY BOOKS

Designed to aid in and enhance the public library planning and evaluation process, the "Statistical Report '95 of the Public Library Data Service" is now available. The current edition will help library managers identify top performing libraries, compare service levels and provide documentation for funding requests. Also included are the results of a special survey on technology.

The data contained in this year's report was collected from 816 public libraries in the United States and Canada. Categories include financial information, library resources and community measures, annual usage figures, output measures and role selection. Library identification information also is provided.

The special section this year focuses on technology in public libraries. Statistics are detailed for several areas including OPACs; internet access in the library; internet accounts to patrons and local information databases.

This year's report was compiled by the Library Research Center of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign under contract with PLA. PLA and LRC are working to develop an electronic version of the report and the data from previous reports.

## ★INTERACTIVE WEB BOOK

The MIT Press is pleased to announce its first World Wide Web interactive book, *City of Bits: Space, Place, and the Infobahn* by MIT's Dean of Architecture William J. Mitchell. Published simultaneously on the Web and in traditional hardcover book form, \*City of Bits\* is a book about a new type of city, a largely invisible but increasingly important system of virtual spaces interconnected by the emerging information superhighway.

Not simply the ascii text of a book with the occasional hyperlink and a few images, *City of Bits* is a graphically rich site that has been enhanced with over 200 links and exceptional social and navigational functionality.

The on-line version of *City of Bits* is meant to function as a companion to its printed counterpart. The in-text hotlinks and the "Surf Sites" catalog of topic-specific links allow readers to customize their browsing itinerary for either casual or calculated exploration on the Web.

One of the most interesting features of *City of Bits* is the "Read and Send Comments" feature, which is an integral part of the site. Readers are encouraged to post comments or queries - to skywrite - anywhere within the text. The postings are literally embedded in the text to become part of an on-going discourse in which the author will also participate, answering questions and elaborating on or countering readers' editorials.

We are not charging an entrance fee for this experimental site. (This is not simply an act of charity: Advance indications are that publicity associated with the availability of the on-line version will enhance rather than diminish sales of the printed version of *City of Bits*.) Our hope is that the site will provide an opportunity for our publishing colleagues as well as our readers to think in new ways about what publishing electronically can mean.

#### Internet Pub Library: Volunteer Opportunities

The Internet Public Library, an experimental service run by students and volunteers, is seeking staff for our "Ask Reference" service. The reference service answers dozens of questions each week received by the IPL via the World Wide Web or electronic mail. This is an excellent opportunity to share your reference and subject expertise with a wide and diverse community while learning about how the Internet can supplement traditional reference service and resources.

Answering the questions generally involves locating information and sending brief messages for short factual requests, or providing suggestions for research strategies and/or sources to consult for broader, general questions. Many of our patrons' queries cannot be answered using Internet resources, and we often refer patrons to appropriate resources and services in "physical" libraries.

Librarians, reference staff and library students interested in participating in this effort need to have access to the

World Wide Web and electronic mail. Patrons' questions are received via electronic mail or the World Wide Web, and are compiled and posted in a WWW-accessible format known as "Hypernews." Questions are compiled daily, and we would like each volunteer to answer at least one or two questions a week.

The Internet Public Library is an attempt to bring traditional library expertise, services and values to the Internet community. It started as a graduate seminar at the University of Michigan's School of Information and Library Studies, and continues to be run by students and volunteers from around the world. The "Ask Reference" service provides a free source of information and guidance to anyone with an electronic mail account. Through this service, we hope to learn more about the information needs of the Internet community, the potential and the limitations of providing reference service via an electronic medium, and how to help library service providers become familiar with some of the more useful Internet resources available.

The Library in general and the "Ask Reference" service in particular have proven to be popular resources, with exposure in places such as Wired magazine, the library section of America On-line's Internet resource list, and newspapers across the United States and Canada. This has given us a very diverse group of users who provide our reference staff with a rich variety of questions and excellent opportunities to help users connect with library resources, both virtual and physical.

### ★HEALTHWEB ESTABLISHED

The health sciences librarians and information professionals from the Big Ten universities and the

University of Chicago (the CIC - the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) are building HealthWeb, a tool to facilitate access to health-related electronic information resources found on the Internet. HealthWeb is a collaborative effort to present a collection of selected and evaluated resources rather than an exhaustive index of health-related information. It will provide an integrated interface to the selected resources.

The development of HealthWeb is the responsibility of five subgroups, each with its own charge: Communication, Content, Design, Planning and Technical. In addition, each CIC health sciences library will concentrate on disciplines in which it and its institution excels. Within each area of excellence, the library will perform four functions:

1. Identify relevant resources available via the Internet.
2. Evaluate the resources using the input of subject experts.
3. Annotate, organize and provide access to the approved resources via the HealthWeb.
4. Make new resources available on the Internet by establishing contacts with key providers, identifying potential resources and working cooperatively with the resource providers to mount and maintain the material.

The staff of the Alfred Taubman Medical Library at The University of Michigan has developed the first prototype for HealthWeb in the field of nursing with assistance from the School of Nursing and the CIC Health Sciences Libraries Internet Working Group. The URL is:

In addition to the Internet-based resources, the page also includes information on doctoral programs around the world in the Education section. This unique, hard-to-find information represents the first step in enriching the page with material from the nursing community.

Two other prototype pages are under development - radiology from Indiana University and minority health from Michigan State University. Eventually HealthWeb will serve as a valuable entry point to the Internet for the health sciences community.

In March of this year, the National Library participated in a week-long demonstration of an electronic library project by working with the Library of Congress and two schools in Canada and the United States. The schools were able to access information on Canada's Confederation and the U.S. Civil War through Internet links to both libraries. ✓ **Ticketmaster launches Internet home page.**

Ticketmaster Corp. launched an Internet service in June as part of a plan by the giant agency to shift its business to online ticketing. Ticketmaster Online, part of the Internet's World Wide Web, will include information on more than 10,000 live events at 400 venues and likely will offer electronic ticketing within a year, said Alan Citron, a company spokesman.

Ticketmaster already offers ticketing by modem to America Online customers in selected areas but cannot do sales over the Internet until it finds a secure way to handle cash transactions in cyberspace. With \$1.6 billion in gross ticket sales and some \$240 million in service-fee revenues, "We don't want to be the pioneer in that area," Citron said.

The online service will include ticket information and seating charts for concerts, sporting events, plays and other entertainment at 400 arenas, stadiums, theatres and concert halls under contract to Ticketmaster nationwide. That number gradually will rise to 2,000 venues, and some sites in London, Mexico City and Canada may also be included. Hypertext links will allow users to get information on ticketing sites and local telephone numbers with the click of a mouse.

In addition to ticket information, Ticketmaster Online will offer news on sports and entertainment -- mostly from published sources such as the trade newspaper Variety. The company plans to add merchandising and "subtle" forms of advertising to the free service in the near future.

Ticketmaster plans to launch Live! magazine early next year, is working on a plan to sell airline tickets and is holding discussions with cable companies over a possible joint venture television channel.
