Showing Off Your Library Things to Show MLAs Visits by MLAs/Councillors

The goal of showing off your library is to create an understanding of the scope of services provided and to extinguish the perception that the library is only about borrowing books.

1. Services based on community needs assessment

All library services should be founded on regular community needs assessments. The assessment should be beyond regular users.

- 2. Facility highlights
- 3. Technology

Recent enhancements, community access terminals, Wifi access, searching the collection, eReader assistance, website

- 4. Books range of collection based on #1
- DVD/Video/CD (not in competition with local outlets). Videos non-commercial scope
- 6. Audio books (explain the range of users don't forget the disability groups)
- 7. Interlibrary loan

Show how participation in interlibrary loan increases the size of user collections. Talk about the size of your collection, the regions/city, the province.

8. Databases

Show visitor specific databases including full text newspapers from across the world in a wide range of languages, automobile/machinery repair manuals online, language training, student learning support databases, anything you think would be of interest to your visitor.

9. Energy saving innovations

Anything that the library has done to make it energy efficient (solar panels, wind generator), special glass or insulation . . . and how the sharing of books is big time recycling.

- 10. Programs highlight programs and expected outcomes
- 11. Partnerships with community groups

Highlight the community partnerships that the library has. These should include all the groups that the library provides free space to meet or to operate a program such as adult literacy, preschool reading/literacy, parent supports, student homework groups, travel clubs, new Canadian drop-in services.

12. Relationships with authors

Highlight the role libraries play with authors as they research material for books.

13. Relationship with budding writers

Highlight any workshops or special services provided to support budding writers. These could include author talks, writers in residence, writing workshops.

14. Persons with disabilities

Demonstrate the basic services provided such as audio books and large print books. If your computers are equipped with special programs, show these off.

15. Seniors

Home delivery, large print books, audio books, meeting place, programs.

16. Preschoolers

Describe the services provided and the importance of developing early literacy skills and an appreciation for reading. Point out the positive impact for youngsters entering Kindergarten/Grade one.
