MANITOBA LAUNCHES PROVINCEWIDE REVIEW OF LIBRARY SYSTEM

Improved Access Sought: Squires

Manitoba will launch a program and policy review of libraries and the services they provide across the province, Sport, Culture and Heritage Minister Rochelle Squires announced today.

"Libraries can build bridges between communities, inspire young readers and offer the key that unlocks the imagination," Squires said. "We want to ensure the support we provide and the services that are offered are delivered as efficiently and effectively as possible."

While public libraries have undertaken significant modernization efforts, provincial policies have changed very little over the past 30 years the minister said. She added this review will look at issues impacting public libraries as well as identify priorities and opportunities for efficiency.

The minister said stakeholder surveys and forums will gather information that will be used to guide the development of improved library policies, noting the goal is to achieve high-quality service at a reasonable cost to taxpayers. More information on how library service providers can contribute to this effort will be available in the coming weeks.

Welcome to 2017!

While 2016 was a very active year for the public library community, let's look forward to the opportunities and challenges of the upcoming year!

The **provincial government** announced in November that it will begin its **program and policy review of libraries and the services they provide** across the province. We understand that the Province will soon be sending surveys to all public libraries to gather information. While we encourage all public libraries to participate in these surveys, it is important that all stakeholders (including patrons and the municipal partners) take the opportunity to voice their concerns, needs, suggestions and even praises, whether through the surveys or by other means, including writing letters and attendance at forums.

A recent news item highlighted the **provincial government's intention to consider the 'return on investment' for its funding**. Obviously public libraries provide much more than simply economic benefits, but such an approach cannot be ignored, and it's up to library stakeholders to make a case for all the benefits. Some libraries have conducted **economic impact studies** (Bibliothèque Allard in Manitoba, Toronto Public Library) that provide quantitative evidence of economic return. We also note the Winnipeg Public Library website has a 'Library Value Calculator' that allows members to calculate the value of services they receive in a month.

While there were many **news items about libraries** in 2016, many were positive stories about the joy and benefits people express about their public library. MLTA has contributed to articles in our newsletter, the *AMM Municipal Leader* ("The economics of public libraries" Fall 2016, p. 34) and were interviewed for an article in the *Manitoba Cooperator* ("Funds for libraries will be key talking points during Manitoba's public library" Dec. 13, 2016). 2017 will be a year of transition as our membership voted in principle for MLTA to become a Division in a newly restructured Manitoba Library Association. Expected to take effect on Jan. 1, 2018, representatives of the different Manitoba library associations will continue to work together to develop the appropriate structure and governance to create one library association to speak with one voice on common interests.

Finally, MLTA would ask library Boards to consider joining our organization and encourage their Trustees to participate on our Board. We speak on behalf of library Trustees who represent public libraries - whether rural, urban, northern or some combination – but we also know that Trustees heed the opinions and counsel of their librarians. In the proposed MLA, Library Trustees will have a permanent voice on the MLA Board, but its real influence will be based upon participation of Trustees and the memberships of public library Boards.

November 21, 2016 Annual General Meeting Business Highlights



- 1. 23 people attended the meeting; the best attendance ever. Regretfully Hon. Rochelle Squires was unable to attend as our guest speaker, as originally arranged. This was disappointing.
- 2. Election of a Board of Directors for 2017 that will be led by new Chairperson Andrew Robert.
- 3. Annual membership fee rate for MLTA will remain the same for 2017.
- 4. Proposal and ratification vote for MLTA to become a Division of the Manitoba Library Association in 2018

Donna Kormilo highlighted the purpose of the restructuring, the pros and cons, and the position that the MLTA Board of Directors has taken regarding the dissolution of MLTA per se and becoming a "division" of MLA. The following motion received approval:

MOTION: That the MLTA agrees, in principle, to dissolve as a stand-alone organization in order to become a Division of a reformed Manitoba Library Association, provided that the transition and operating terms are amenable. Dissolution and reformation is expected to take effect on January 1, 2018.

November 21, 2016 Annual General Meeting MLTA Chair's Report

Our priority action areas are:

- To improve communication and networking with members;
- To align MLTA priorities with provincial and municipal government priorities; and
- To further develop the MLTA Board of Directors to increase involvement.

Major Accomplishments

- Being an active member of the Manitoba Libraries Working Group re: formation of "One Library Association" in Manitoba, speaking up on behalf of trustee and rural interests. The rationale, benefits and terms of becoming a Division of a restructured Manitoba Library Association were discussed throughout the year at our Board table.
- MLTA planned, sponsored and hosted the sessions titled "Transformers" and "Success Stories" for the May 4-6, 2016 Manitoba Libraries Conference.
- MLTA Board made more of an effort to contact and network with library trustees and staff around the province, explaining our role and how we could support them, but also to learn about their needs and situations.
- Wrote a letter to the Newfoundland provincial government requesting them to reconsider the proposed reduction of the number of public libraries in their province.
- Met with staff from the Public Library Services Branch and representatives from the Provincial Arts Branch to reply to their question "What are the challenges faced by Manitoba public libraries when it comes to library funding and programming?" Our response was based on ideas and information sent in from a variety of libraries around the province; for this we are grateful and appreciative. This info was forwarded to AMM, as support to their resolutions.
- Maintaining our website and newsletter to communicate news, educate trustees (e.g. Accessibility Plan requirements), and share success stories and projects from Library Boards around Manitoba. www.mlta.ca

Looking ahead to 2017, our priorities include:

- Continue active involvement with the Manitoba Libraries Working Group as the transition plan for restructuring the Manitoba Library Association is developed.
- Broaden and increase representation of rural and northern trustees from all areas of the province.
- To advocate and engage in public discussions on issues important to public libraries, with a particular focus on issues affecting rural and northern communities.
- Continue to provide information and education to trustees through newsletters, email communications and website.

I am grateful for the continuing support and advice provided by the MLTA Board of Directors, the Public Library Services Branch of Manitoba Sport, Culture and Heritage, and my colleagues on the Western Manitoba Regional Library Board.

Guest Speaker's Remarks Trevor Surgenor, Director Manitoba Public Library Services Branch (PLSB)


Trevor Surgenor, Director of Public Library Services Branch, delivering his message on behalf of the Government of Manitoba.


